Every day, our Neighbourhood Policing teams play a crucial role in supporting and protecting our communities, and this week was about saying thank you for those ongoing efforts.

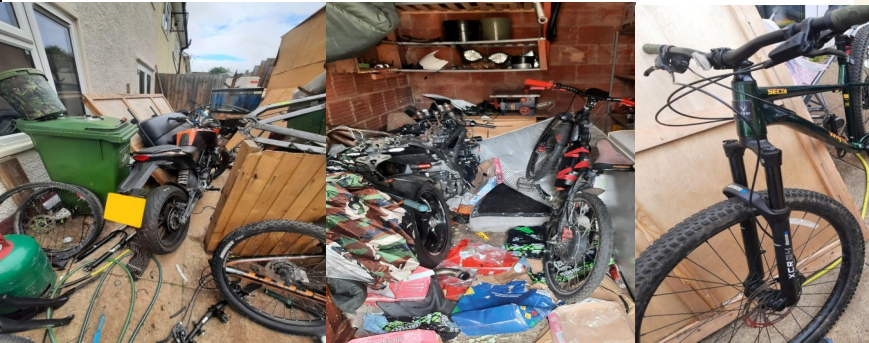

Early Warning Signs of Child Criminal Exploitation

Child Criminal Exploitation can affect any young person, regardless of background. Offenders often use grooming tactics; building trust, offering gifts or attention to gradually pull a child into situations that become risky or criminal. Many young people don't realise they are being exploited, which makes early awareness essential.

Recognising the Signs

While every child is different, certain changes may indicate they are being groomed or exploited. These can include unexplained items or gifts, going missing or staying out late, regularly missing school, or losing interest in activities they once enjoyed. What You Can Do as a Parent or Carer

Parents can feel powerless when something doesn't feel right, but there are practical steps you can take that will make a difference.

Keep Communication Open

Start conversations gently and avoid blame or confrontation. Approaching a young person in this way helps them feel listened to and safe, which can make them more willing to open up. Keeping communication open also gives you the opportunity to support them and help them navigate the situation.

Strengthen Digital Safety

Grooming is increasingly happening online, making digital safety an important protective factor. You can support your child by:

- Enabling built in phone safety features, including location tracking (Find My iPhone, Google Family Link).
- Setting screen time limits and content filters using parental control settings.
- Using reputable monitoring tools that help identify concerning patterns such as messages from strangers, explicit content, or manipulative behaviour.
- Reviewing social media privacy settings to ensure they only communicate with people they know.

Trust Your Instincts

If something doesn't feel right, trust your instincts. You know your child better than anyone. Try to keep communication open and keep a note of any signs that concern you. Over time, these small details can help safeguarding professionals build a clearer understanding of what may be happening. If you are worried, please reach out for help early. FRAUD AWARENESS

Courier Fraud Warning

In 2025, criminals stole £21 million from victims of courier fraud. In Avon and Somerset alone, there was a financial loss of £346,000.

City of London Police are issuing a renewed warning to the public as courier fraud continues to evolve across the UK, with criminals using increasingly sophisticated and persistent tactics. A key feature of this threat is the disproportionate targeting of older people, particularly those aged 70 and above. This group makes up majority of victims, with those aged between 76 and 96 alone accounting for around 62 per cent of all reports.

Courier fraud typically begins with an unexpected phone call. A criminal impersonates a police officer, bank official, or fraud investigator and convinces the victim that their money, account, or identity is at risk. The victim is told they are helping an investigation and is instructed to withdraw cash or purchase high-value goods such as gold or jewellery.

A courier is then sent to collect the money or items. They may also be asked to hand over their bank card and PIN. They may instead be asked to transfer money or send items in the post. The victim is promised that everything will be reimbursed once the investigation concludes. In reality, both the caller and courier are part of a coordinated criminal network. Once handed over, the money or valuables are gone.

Criminals are becoming increasingly persistent, sometimes staying in contact with victims for days or weeks, guiding their actions step by step. In many cases, victims are coached on what to say to bank staff or shop employees to avoid raising suspicion.

How to protect yourself from courier fraud:

- **Transferring money:** Your bank or the police will never ask you to transfer money to a safe account.
- **Couriers:** Your bank or the police will never send a courier to your home to collect bank cards, cash, or other valuables such as jewellery.
- **Check if it's genuine:** For any contact you are unsure of, hang up and contact the organisation directly using contact details you know are correct, such as those on official websites, the back of your card or by calling 159 for your bank.
- **Caller ID:** Don't trust the Caller ID display on your phone - it's not proof of ID.
- **Report suspicious calls:** You can report suspected scam calls by sending a text to 7726 with the word 'Call' followed by the caller's number.

COMMUNITY SPEEDWATCH

Many of you may have heard of *Community SpeedWatch* (CSW), but for those who are new to the initiative, it's a local volunteer-led effort aimed at improving road safety across our neighbourhoods.

Community SpeedWatch involves trained volunteers from within the community carrying out speed monitoring checks on selected roads. The purpose isn't enforcement, but awareness—encouraging motorists to slow down by highlighting the very real risks and impact of speeding in residential areas. Whether it's the danger posed to pedestrians or the disruption caused to daily life, speeding affects everyone, and addressing it is something we are committed to working on alongside our communities.

Across the Taunton area, there are currently 14 active Community SpeedWatch groups operating in a range of locations. These sites vary significantly:

- **Urban areas** typically experience **higher traffic volumes**, ranging from **500 to 1,400 vehicles per hour**.
- **Rural locations**, while quieter with **50 to 200 vehicles per hour**, tend to see a higher proportion of drivers **exceeding speed limits**.

A key finding across both environments is the ongoing challenge with compliance in 20mph zones, which consistently record a higher proportion of speeding vehicles—regardless of whether the setting is urban or rural.

The insights gathered by CSW volunteers are vital in helping us understand local traffic behaviours and identify areas for improvement. By continuing to support and expand Community SpeedWatch, we can build stronger, safer communities where everyone feels more secure on the roads.

Activity during June

Out of the 14 active Community Speedwatch schemes in the area, **6** schemes were operational, carrying out **13** monitoring sessions across various locations.

During these sessions, volunteers observed an impressive **4,192** vehicles, demonstrating the scale of community engagement and commitment. As a result of these efforts, **109** advisory letters have been issued to drivers who were found to be exceeding the speed limit. We understand that crime statistics can sometimes be difficult to interpret, and we'd like to take a moment to reassure you about how this information is presented.

When crime data is shared publicly, certain offence types are grouped together into broader categories. While our internal systems allow us to view much more detailed and specific information, what we are permitted to release is simplified to make it accessible for the public.

For example, one of the categories you may have seen is "Violent Crime." This category includes a wide range of incidents, one of the most common being domestic-related incidents. These types of calls make up a significant portion of the incidents we attend as Police.

It's important to understand that not all offences within this category carry the same level of severity, and grouping them together can sometimes give a misleading impression of the overall risk within the community.
